The National Association for Chicana and Chicano Studies is the academic organization that serves academic programs, departments and research centers that focus on issues pertaining to Mexican Americans, Chicana/os, and Latina/os. The Association was formed in 1972, during the height of the Chicana/o movement, calling for the development of a space where scholarship and Chicana/o students could develop their talents in higher education. For more than 30 years, students, faculty, staff, and community members have attended the NACCS annual conference to present their scholarly papers--many of which have spun into important intellectual pillars.

CONFERENCE THEME

RELATIONAL HISTORIES, INTER-ETHNIC ALLIANCES: CHICAN@/X COALITION POLITICS IN TEJAS

The conference situates race as a starting point for examining the multiple oppressions that have governed life in Texas. It builds on the idea that citizenship, sexuality, gender, labor organizing, class, pop culture, politics, and religion serve as modalities through which race is lived and performed in Texas.

Chican@/x Studies is an expansive and growing field. Our collective histories, our testimonios, offer stories of Mexican and Mexican American life in Texas that illuminate the broader realities of racism, heterosexism, violence, colonialism, and extreme nationalisms. As Mexican immigrants and Mexican Americans, we have a history that has struggled alongside other aggrieved groups and pushed back against the indignities of an unequal and oppressive system, even as the irregular political ground that has rooted these movements has challenged notions of a collective "we." There is an urgency today for scholarship to reflect the history of inter-ethnic organizing, to better explain the ways racism manifests itself and how it is sustained and/or promoted in Texas, and how Chican@/x communities—from El Paso to Dallas/Fort Worth to the Rio Grande Valley—continue to be engaged in political and artistic struggles to combat precisely such racism. It is the historical struggle that reflects the dignity, quest for justice, and the soul of the Chican@/x community.

NACCS CHAIR WELCOME

On behalf of the NACCS Tejas Foco 2017 planning committee, we would like to welcome you to Texas A&M University and the Bryan/College Station area. Our committee has been hard at work to make sure everything is in place for a conference that will open spaces for critical reflection, storytelling, laughter, and strategic planning as we imagine a better future together. All this good work will take place in the newly renovated Memorial Student Center (MSC), which is centrally located across Kyle Field (football stadium) and home to the campus bookstore, multiple meeting spaces, and restaurants.

Texas A&M University is a proud institution with an important legacy steeped in its military tradition, commitment to service, and academic excellence. But as you may have noticed, Texas A&M and the surrounding Bryan/College Station area has also experienced tremendous growth and change. The students presented those signatures to the Dean of the College of Liberal Arts where they received an enthusiastic thumbs up. From there a small group of faculty from across the College of Liberal Arts organized a list of courses that today make up the LMAS minor. As we strive to grow LMAS at Texas A&M, our students continue to inspire us as they engage in struggles so common to institutions of higher learning: increasing diversity, fostering respect for all people, and promoting and creating a learning environment that embraces all voices. The hard work that the students are engaged in is supported by a strong group of staff and faculty that together believes another University is indeed possible. Thank you for your support and we look forward to welcoming you to our campus and to what will no doubt be a transformative NACCS Tejas Foco in 2017!



Dr. Chris Carmona | Writing Workshop

Dr. Carmona is an Assistant Professor in the Department of English. He received his PhD in Rhetoric, Writing, and Poetics from Texas A&M University in 2012. His specialty areas are Rhetoric & Writing, Beat Poetry, and Chican@ poetics. Dr. Sarah McNamara | Oral History Workshop



Sarah McNamara joined the faculty in 2016 after earning her Ph.D. in History from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. She specializes in Latina/o, women and gender, immigration and labor, and oral history. McNamara is at work on her first book, tentatively titled, "From Picket Lines to Picket Fences: Latinas and the Remaking of the Jim Crow South." Her manuscript traces the transformation of Latina/o politics and culture between the Great Depression and the civil rights movement in Florida by examining the choices immigrant Cuban and later American-born Latinas made to achieve political representation and social justice for themselves and their community. McNamara's work

has received support from the American Historical Association, the Tulane Center for the Gulf South, the American Libraries Association, and the National Endowment for the Humanities.



ROGELIO SAENZ, PH.D.

Rogelio Sáenz is Dean of the College of Public Policy and holds the Mark G. Yudof Endowed Chair at the University of Texas at San Antonio. Sáenz has written extensively in the areas of demography, Latina/os, race and ethnic relations, inequality, immigration, public policy, social justice, and human rights. He is co-author of Latinos in the United States: Diversity and Change (Polity Press) and is also

co-editor of The International Handbook of the Demography of Race and Ethnicity (Springer Press). Sáenz regularly writes op-ed essays on current demographic, social, race, economic, and political issues with his contributions appearing in such newspapers as the Austin American-Statesman, El Paso Times, New York Times, Rio Grande Guardian, and the San Antonio Express-News. He is also a Policy Fellow of the Carsey School of Public Policy at the University of New Hampshire.

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
